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# Children's Mental Health Week

# MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER, MR. LANE

This Sunday is the fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time and in Mark's Gospel, we will hear how Jesus and his followers went to a town called Capernaum. When the Sabbath day came, Jesus went into the synagogue and began to teach. Everyone was astonished because Jesus, unlike their other teachers, taught with real authority. While Jesus was teaching, he was interrupted by a very sick man who started to shout wildly and was trembling and shaking. So Jesus paused and healed the sick man in full view of the people. They were amazed and said to each other, "Here is a teaching that is new and with authority behind it." The news about Jesus quickly spread through the surrounding countryside.



Next week on Thursday 1st February is the Feast Day of one of our class saints, St Brigid. St Brigid is the name of one of our Year 1 classes whose teacher is Miss Okwong. She is also known as Brigid of Ireland or the 'mother saint' of Ireland. According to tradition she was born in 451AD and died in 525AD. She was believed to have been an abbess who founded several convents of nuns, most notably that of Kildare, which was one of the most important in Ireland. She is patroness of many things, including poetry, learning, healing, protection, blacksmithing, livestock and dairy production. On St Brigid's Day, I remember making St Brigid crosses at school in Ireland to celebrate her feast day. It is believed if you hung a St Brigid cross in your home it protected it from fire. Did you know that St Brigid's Day is now a public holiday in Ireland and the first to be named after a woman - this year it will take place on Monday 5th February 2024.



Last week I let you know about Islington Council's plans for the next phase of the School Streets programme, how plans are progressing for a build-out on Geary Street and how they are proposing to introduce improvements to the footpath on Geary Street including:

- Extending footway to create more space outside of the school gate on Geary Street for people walking and parents gathering
- Raising the carriageway outside the school gate to encourage vehicles to slow their speed
- Two new trees to provide new greenery
- New tactile paving to support people crossing the street.



The construction is scheduled to commence later this term and members of the school staff are meeting officers from Islington Council this coming Monday 29th January to discuss further so will be in a better position to share with you the impact these works will have on our school in the coming weeks.




One child per class is awarded a VIP certificate in our celebration assemblies. They also get lunch on a specially decorated table with table service!

While he was teaching, Jesus was interrupted by a very sick man who started to shout wildly and whose body was trembling and shaking. So Jesus paused and healed the sick man in full view of the people. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. "Here is a teaching that is new," they said, "and with authority behind it." And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.






# KSI Phase News

In our Science lesson in Y1 St Brigid this week, we observed our environment and learned about seasonal changes. In the winter, we noticed that the ground was covered in frost.


Year 2 St John Paul had an exciting RE lesson this week using drama to retell the story of Moses. We heard the story and discussed the key events in Moses' life. Once we had mastered that we began to look at subtracting tens and ones! We have been working so hard and now, some of us can even do the jumps in our heads without using the hundred square!



# LKS2 Phase News

In St Bernadette, the children have been learning how to subtract three digit numbers using the column method. They have worked hard in their lessons. The children moved onto word problems with subtracting and they were asked to show their working out and explain. Have a look at Jesse's work opposite.



In St Martin de Porres, we have been learning about rocks in our Science lessons. This week we explored the three different types of rock and how they are formed. We then sorted a range of rocks into their correct rock types based on their properties and how they are formed. We also discussed what sort of things we use rocks for and then created posters to showcase our rock knowledge.


This term, St Catherine have been receiving cricket sessions from Platform. The children have been really enjoying our sessions with Coach Ketan. So far, we have studied catching and batting techniques and used these in whole class matches. Our skills are really coming on in leaps and bounds!



Y4 St Elizabeth are developing the skills of sketch and collage in our Art lessons this term. We have recapped the types of shading we learnt in year 3 (for example, hatching, cross hatching, ink wash) and started to think about selecting the most appropriate option for a specific purpose. We also started to consider how to portray mood in our sketching. After we looked at some examples, we explored using a heavy grip to present anger and using a lighter grip to demonstrate calm. Take a look!

# UKS2 Phase News

Last Friday, Year 5 Saint Faustina went to Gillespie Park to take part in the 'Garden Classroom'. We discussed problems caused by a lack of sustainability and what we can do to help. We took part in a range of activities such as looking at pictures of events that have happened due to climate change and the impact on animals and plants in their habitats. Well done to all of Saint Faustina on your interest and compassion during the workshop!



Year 5 Saint Benedict have been writing our own diary entries recently, in role as one of the wolf-men from our English core text 'Viking Boy'. We have worked really hard to envisage ourselves as one of the characters and include lots of description in our diary entries! Next week, we will be writing another diary entry from a different perspective. Keep up the hard work Year 5!

Year 6 Saint Maximilian have been working very hard in English. We have been exploring the story of 'The Three Little Pigs' and have been exploring both sides of the story: were the pigs really innocent? Next week, we are going to write two letters to 'Daily Wolf's' newspaper editor- one letter siding with the pigs and the other letter siding with the wolf. Who will come out on top?...



This week, in Year 6 Saint Josephine, we have been learning about voltage! We learnt that voltage is a measure of how strong the current is in a circuit. It is what "pushes" the current through the circuit to a device. We created two circuits: one with two cells and the other one with one cell. We discovered that the circuit with two cells has more voltage so the buzzer was louder.
